

Caring for young relatives - Family or friend (kinship) carers

What is family, friend or kinship care?

Family or friend care, also known as kinship care is when grandparents or other family members step in to raise a relative's or friend's child. This usually happens when the child's parents are no longer able to care for their child.

Many people do not realise that they are a carer, as they feel that it is something that they should do. The care arrangements may be very informal or in some cases the carer can formally foster or become the legal guardian of the child or young person.

Emotional and practical support for carers

Financial, practical and emotional support is available to carers to help them look after themselves and the person that they care for. There are a number of organisations that can help carers.

Newcastle Carers can offer information and support if you care for a child or young person who is ill, disabled, has mental health or has substance misuse problems.

Kinship (previously known as Grandparents plus) offer support to grandparents, siblings, aunts, uncles, and family friends who step up to raise children when their parents can't. They have an information and advice service and peer support. Email, call or connect with them on Facebook.

<u>The Relative Experience Project</u> gives help and support to grandparents and their family members who are bringing up a relative's child, often in very difficult circumstances. They have Kinship Carer support groups.

Barnardo's offer counselling and support services. They can help with:

- parenting advice
- · mental health
- bereavement
- family stress or break-down

- neglect
- back to school
- discrimination
- barriers to accessing and using services
- Wellness Recovery project for woman and children who have been victims of, and affected by, domestic abuse and sexual violence
- Newcastle Young People's Support Team
- Young Dads Work, an early intervention and prevention service to young dads and parents and children at risk of entering the safeguarding or looked after arena
- <u>Boloh</u> a free telephone helpline and web chat for adult asylum seekers or a Black, Asian or Minority Ethnic parents or carers. Their advisors speak English, Urdu and Hindi. They provide advice, signposting and emotional support. They can help with advice about respiratory problems and Hong Kong nationals settling in the UK.

The Lifting Neighbourhoods Together project has a kinship carers support group in Walker

Financial support

If you care for a child or young person you may be able to claim **Child Benefit**.

If you are of working age and caring for a child you may be able to claim Universal Credit.

Child maintenance

Child maintenance is paid to cover the living costs of a child that you care for. It's usually paid to the person the child lives with and carries out most of the day to day care. The parent (or parents) who doesn't live with the child usually pays child maintenance.

<u>Child Maintenance Service (CMS)</u> is a government service for separated parents to make financial arrangements for their children. Both parents are responsible for paying for your child's living costs, even if they don't live with or see their child. The website explains your options and includes information about family-based arrangements. The CMS can:

- work out how much each parent pays
- arrange payments and take action if a parent does not pay
- sort out disagreements about parentage
- try to find the other parent if you do not know where they are
- keep your location and personal information private, for example, if you've <u>experienced</u> domestic abuse or controlling behaviour.

Benefits advice

It can be useful to speak with someone about the benefits you may be entitled to and how they may impact upon your other benefits. Local independent advice services include:

The NHS Healthy Start Scheme is for people who have children under the age of 4 (or are more than 10 weeks pregnant) who receive certain benefits. Kinship and family carers receiving certain benefits can also apply on behalf of the child they care for. You get a free prepaid card that's topped up every 4 weeks to buy: milk, fruit and vegetables. You can also collect free vitamins from locations listed here. You can use the card in shops that accept Mastercard payments and sell at least one of these Healthy Start foods.

<u>Children and Families Newcastle Early Help Team</u> can help your family to stay?on track. Being a parent or carer can be a tough?job and sometimes we all need?a bit of help. You can ask for help with an ongoing?problem or get help to prevent one from happening. You don't need to face challenges on your own. They have hubs in Newcastle where you can help information, help, training and advice.

Moving from Children's to Adult's Social Care usually happens when a young person reaches the age of 18. Everyone is different. Your Social Work Team will work with you to understand what support you need and when is the right time for you to move to Adult Social Care support, if you still need it. Am I a carer?

You are a carer if you give unpaid care and support to someone who can't manage without your help. This could be a family member, friend, partner or neighbour. The person you look after may have:

- a disability or learning disability
- a long term or life limiting illness
- mental health difficulties
- alcohol or drug related problems
