With many new councillors in place, there may be an initial period of adjustment. In the meantime, Newcastle City Council will continue to deliver the services residents rely on.

Carers Week 2026 (8 – 15 June) is an annual campaign recognising and raising awareness of unpaid carers. There are around 5.8 million unpaid carers in the UK. A carer looks after someone who could not manage without their support – this could be because of an illness, disability, mental health problem or addiction.

This year, the theme is ‘Building Carer Friendly Communities’. This will highlight the impact of carer-friendly communities can have in making a difference to the lives of carers everywhere.

Free Energy Bills Support

If you're struggling with energy bills, did you know that you can get free, end-to-end support?

The HEAT service is available for anyone in England, Scotland or Wales experiencing energy-related difficulties, with a particular focus on supporting the most vulnerable households, including those that:

- Are struggling with energy costs or fuel debt
- Are unemployed or on low incomes
- Are at risk of going off supply
- Need support to stabilise their situation
- Are over 65 or have disabilities or health conditions requiring higher energy use

There are lots of different ways that they can support you. They include:

- Personalised support, with a dedicated energy mentor providing 1-to-1 help
- Fuel vouchers or food vouchers (if eligible) for those at risk or off supply
- Negotiation with energy suppliers to reduce debt and agree manageable repayment plans
- Help to resolve incorrect, complex or disputed energy bills
- Support to keep households on energy supply
- Practical advice and support to reduce energy use, cut waste and keep bills as low as possible
- Help applying for financial support and energy schemes
- Supporting households from crisis to a more stable situation

29 May to 30 May 2026, Newcastle University

Are you interested in the language and accents of the North-East of England? If you are aged 65+ and were raised in Tyneside, Wearside, County Durham or Northumberland, you can take part in a PhD research project exploring the speech, accents and hearing of older people in the region.

Education Partnership North East

Education Partnership North East is a collaboration between Northumberland College, Hartlepool Sixth Form, and Sunderland College.

Recently, they announced that they have now updated their offer of fully funded Virtual Learning courses, and they are now available to adults who are aged 19+, lived in the UK for more than 3 years and not on an apprenticeship. Asylum seekers and Refugees require to have lived in the UK for 6 months and have the relevant eligibility to work.
